Members of the Wichita County Historical Commission received the proclamation from Judge Jim Johnson during the May 14th Commissioners Court.



Bit of History The Legacy of the Iron Lung





THE LEGACY
OF THE
IRON LUNG





Citizens of Archer County contributed their nickels and dimes to purchase an iron lung during the polio epidemic. This iron lung now resides in the Museum of North Texas History. The legacy of the iron lung date back to 1928.

The concept of using a negative pressure device to facilitate breathing dates back to 1670. However, in 1928, Philip Drinker and Louis Shaw developed the iron lung we know today. A metal cylinder, enclosing a patient's body with their head exposed, was powered by an engine or manually. The negative pressure created inside the cylinder expanded the patient's lungs, bringing in air. Then, the cylinder would exert positive pressure, forcing air out of the lungs.

Though initially used as a treatment for coal gas poisoning, the iron lung served as a symbol of the polio epidemic during the 40s and 50s. Hospitals wards were filled

with children and adults, breathing thanks to an iron lung.

A museum in Marquette, Michigan houses an iron lung made with salvaged materials including iron barrels and wooden crates. In December 1940, Marquette had the largest grouping of iron lungs in the United States. Sadly, Marquette didn't long hold the record.

Recently, a man who had lived over 70 years in an iron lung passed away. Paul Alexander contracted polio at age six and lived the remainder of his life in an iron lung. After learning glossopharyngeal breathing, Alexander was able to leave the iron lung for periods of time. His story presents an amazing study in strength of character. **See his story here.**

Newer mechanisms to assist breathing have been developed using positive pressure, forcing air into a patient's lungs through intubations. However, the iron lung remains the method that most imitates natural lung expansion and breathing.






